ACTION REQUEST:

Approval of Academic Calendar for 2008-2009

The following principles influence the academic calendar on the Ann Arbor campus:

- The number of class days in the fall term should be as close as possible to the number of class days in the winter term. Fall 2008 has 67 class days and Winter 2009 has 69 days.
- Classes should not begin before September 1. Starting classes in August would lead to significant problems for both students and faculty.
- Fall classes begin on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in September, to ensure starting after Labor Day. Winter classes start the first Wednesday after the first Monday, in order to start after January 2nd.
- Spring break should fall on the eighth week of winter term so that schools and colleges have the option of completing seven-week mini-courses before break.
- The term end date in both the fall and winter is the Tuesday of the 15th week, followed by a single study day before exams start on Thursday and Friday. Exams continue to through the Thursday of the 16th week.

The attached calendar has been shared with many faculty and administrative groups and meets the established criteria.

I am writing to request its approval.
