Subject: Report of Faculty Retirement

Action Requested: Adoption of Retirement Memoir

James A. Hayman, M.D., M.B.A., clinical professor of radiation oncology in the Medical School, retired from active faculty status on September 30, 2023.

Dr. Hayman received his M.D. and M.B.A. degrees from the University of Chicago in 1991. He completed his internship in 1992 at Northwestern University's Evanston Hospital in Evanston, Illinois, and his radiation oncology residency in 1996 at Harvard University's Joint Center for Radiation Therapy in Boston, Massachusetts. That same year, he joined the University of Michigan faculty in the Department of Radiation Oncology as a clinical assistant professor. He was promoted to clinical associate professor in 2003 and clinical professor in 2008. In 2012, he also achieved board certification in hospice and palliative medicine.

Over 27 years, Dr. Hayman has made significant contributions through his research and leadership roles. He is among the small group of U.S. radiation oncologists who have been active in the field of health services research and is a national leader in improving cancer care quality. In his department, he first became director of the clinical division in 2002. In 2008, he transitioned to associate chair for clinical activities and medical director for radiation oncology, as well as service chief. Starting in 2019, he also became the ambulatory care clinical chief for radiation oncology. He has served on over 25 national committees for the American Society for Radiation Oncology (ASTRO) or the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) with a focus on improving care. In 2013, he was vice chair of the group that created ASTRO's Accreditation Program for Excellence (APEx). From 2014-2018, Dr. Hayman served as vice chair and then chair of ASTRO's Clinical Affairs and Quality Council while also serving on ASTRO's Board of Directors. In recognition of his service, he was awarded the designation of fellow of the American Society for Radiation Oncology (FASTRO) in 2014 and fellow of the American Society for Clinical Oncology (FASCO) in 2018. Since 2011, Dr. Hayman also served as co-director of the Michigan Radiation Oncology Quality Consortium (MROQC), a statewide collaborative quality initiative.

The Regents now salute this distinguished faculty member by naming **James A. Hayman**, clinical professor emeritus of radiation oncology.
